The programme is designed by professionals who are ODP's, who are registered with the HCPC. The current delivery team comprises of eight ODP's that have worked in many specialisms across health. the real-world experience and enables a realism to teach as experience can bring things to life and provide a platform to aid connection between theory and practice.

Throughout the programme we will apply this experience as we develop you from a novice at entry into level 4 towards the expert that can register with the HCPC upon qualification. Progressing through minor procedures to complex at level 6.

We utilise lectures, seminars, workshops, and simulated learning to prepare you to work alongside professionals in the clinical environment. We will apply theory to practice and give you a realism to aid learning and development. As an example, when discussing Ear Nose and Throat operations, we will be discussing anatomy and physiology as we as the procedure, with added practitioner experiences to making learning more enjoyable, informative and increase your knowledge and understanding.

The placement experiences are developed throughout the programme to enable you to build on personal experience to aid your growth as a practitioner. We have a variety of settings including NHS and the private sector.
