# Evaluating the impact of human rights in limiting or improving responses to public health crises

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### **Project summary**

This research is part of the initiative "Advancing human rights in legal preparedness for public health emergencies in the Global South," aimed at disseminating the Principles and Guidelines on Human Rights and Public Health Emergencies. These Principles offer updated guidelines on integrating human rights considerations into prevention, preparedness and responses to public health emergencies, emphasising the need to balance rights in a proportionate manner and placing State positive obligations at the centre of public health concerns.

The project aims to produce evidence-based and legally robust materials to facilitate better policymaking and legal readiness for public health crises, with clear and easy-to-follow resources. The researcher will contribute by identifying representative case studies and conducting literature reviews, focusing on providing examples of patterns or common conflicts between human rights and public health measures during crises or epidemics. Priority will be given to cases where judicial review has impeded or severely limited the implementation of public health measures, as well as instances showcasing effective adoption of a rights-based approach in such emergencies.

Various outputs are planned, including a website, an educational handbook, and workshops involving participants from the Global South to provide practical guidance on how to implement those standards in policies. Additionally, a side event at the Global Health Security Conference in Sydney, Australia, is scheduled for June. The research conducted will likely be incorporated into one or more of these outputs and may contribute to the legal commentaries of the Principles and other planned academic publications, in collaboration with project partners from the University of Ottawa and the Max Planck Institute.
